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Access Grid® Symposium

Due to the 2020 global pandemic, videoconferencing, though it's been used for years, has now come to the forefront as an important tool for communication and education. Schools are scrambling to install communication resources for online learning. COVID-19 is forcing people into unwanted isolation and many have turned to videoconferencing technology to continue social interactions, work, and education.

Rewind twenty-one years to 1999, Jimmy Miklavcic was working with a ground-breaking group of researchers called the Access Grid®, originally established for researchers across Universities to collaborate on major research projects. One of the original developers was Tom Uram at Argonne National Laboratory in Chicago, Illinois and once the Access Grid® was established, they basically gave it away to the larger community for the benefit of everyone.

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Once that happened, the people who think entrepreneurially began to develop videoconferencing platforms for purchase. Polycom had one of the early hardware and software packages for public use. The user had to purchase the hardware and software together to be able to videoconference and the users at both locations needed the same equipment. Presently, in 2020, videoconferencing is ubiquitous.

The Directors of Another Language Performing Arts Company, after early testing and development throughout 2000-2003, saw the potential for very interesting collaborations with the ability to connect with artists and researchers around the world. The 2003 prototype performance project was *InterPlay: Intransitive Senses* where the company tested the capabilities of the internal network at the Center for High Performance Computing. It was, at that time, one of the few buildings on the University of Utah Campus with a 1 gigabit network.

It took a year to evaluate and improve the logistics and equipment needed to produce each annual networked performance. 2004 *InterPlay: Hallucinations* was the first national project working with artists and technologists from the University of Alaska-Fairbanks and University of Maryland-College Park. A backhoe in Alaska accidentally severed the fiber optic network an hour before showtime, and the connection was quickly re-established just as the performance was to begin. Other challenges throughout the next decade included network speeds, audio and video lag time, audio synchronization, echo cancellation, equipment upgrades, world time differences, network communication etiquette, and ironically, difficulty in communicating even with all the different communication avenues available.

Subsequent *InterPlay* performance were 2005 *InterPlay: Loose Minds in a Box*, 2006 *InterPlay: Dancing on the Banks of Packet Creek*, 2007 *InterPlay: Nel Tempo di Sogno*, 2008 *InterPlay: Carnival*, 2009 *InterPlay: AnARTomy*, and 2010 *InterPlay: Event Horizon*. Additional networked telematic cinema performances included 2011 *Duel*Ality 1.0*, 2012 *Duel*Ality 2.0* in 3D, and 2013 *XYZ* also in 3D.

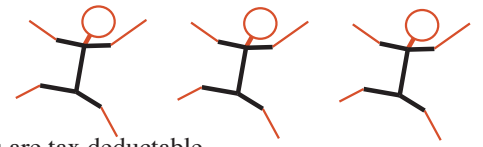

When Another Language began this explorative work, the Company was often met with local resistance, criticism, and misunderstanding as to why to the organization chose to forge forward in this genre. Funding continued to decline and support was minimal. Now, arts organizations are desperately depending on video conferencing and streaming technology as a way to continue performances and community outreach.

It is often the creative pioneers that hack a path through the entangled process of exploration. The Directors of Another Language Performing Arts Company believed, in this case, that there was something important to live video streaming, telematic performance, and network communications. What is happening now, with the adaptation of widespread online learning and artistic presentations, bears witness to the value of creative tenacity.

ART Of The Month

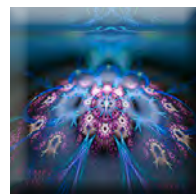

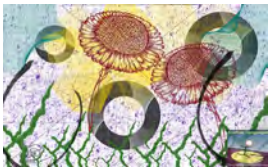

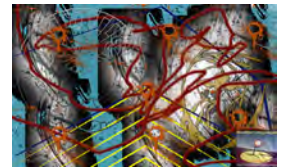
